1. OVERVIEW. Below, please provide a brief overview of the certificate, including the rationale and need for the program, potential size and nature of the target audience, information on comparable programs (at ASU and/or peer institutions), how this program would relate to existing programs at ASU, and any additional appropriate information.

The Graduate Certificate in Critical Theory will provide students with deep background in cultural and social theory, emphasizing critical and analytic skills based in concepts derived from Continental Philosophy. Such knowledge and skills are used widely in teaching and research in the arts, humanities, and social sciences. This is a transdisciplinary certificate, with opportunities to study theoretical approaches as applied across a range of arts, humanities, and social sciences disciplines. While we anticipate that most students entering this certificate program will be from the Department of English, many fields within the humanities (as defined by ASU's Institute for Humanities Research) use and teach critical theory. As such, we do not want to exclude these students from the opportunity to participate in the certificate and the opportunity for students to accumulate skills across disciplinary fields.

Critical theory is a highly marketable supplement to disciplinary training. It provides students with the ability to solve problems in interpretation and analysis both within a discipline and in the practical engagement with a variety of social and cultural sites. Critical theory is a mode of helping one think through problems across disciplines. The course offerings of this certificate allow students a range of courses so they can learn to work cross-disciplinarily and see how critical theory brings together a range of fields related to their particular area of research interests.

This certificate highlights an area of excellence within ASU that can be coupled with an array of graduate disciplinary studies in the humanities, social sciences, and arts, not the least of which is the emergent approach of the Digital Humanities. As such, it sets ASU apart from other major research universities in its increasing opportunities in humanities training and research. It will, furthermore, enhance recruitment of top graduate students, as well as professionalize and train for the job market existing ASU graduate students. By way of example: the Fall 2014 Modern Language Associate Job Information List lists 58 jobs explicitly asking for skills in critical theory. A sampling of jobs in British Romantic literature shows that of the 8 jobs in the Fall 2014 Modern Language Associate Job Information List, 3 explicitly state theory as a desired secondary area and 2 include it as one of many possible secondary skills. Moreover, for students and faculty it provides a means of connecting interests across disciplines; while many faculty teach critical theory, they are unable to connect with other faculty across ASU, for lack of a coherent cohort of transdisciplinary practitioners.

We anticipate 5-10 new students in the first year and 5 -10 new students each year for the subsequent two years, holding steady at approximately 5 new students per year after the first three years. We anticipate students from across disciplines in the humanities, arts, and social sciences, but especially in English, Art History, and Arts Media + Engineering.

Well known comparable programs exist at the University of California--Irvine, the Syracuse Humanities Center, and Rice's Center for Critical and Cultural Theory. ASU's peer institutions do not have a critical theory certificate.

Primary information for the certificate including application information, required and elective courses, advisors and administrators will be on the webpage for the certificate. During course enrollment, we also intend to list classes being offered for the semester so that students can easily see which classes they can enroll in that semester.

Ron Broglio (Director of Graduate Studies, Department of English) and Gregory Castle (Professor, Department of English) will serve as primary advisors for students and will guide students from the admissions process to completion of certificate. The program manager is Sheila Luna (Graduate Studies Program Manager for the Department of English) who will oversee administration of admissions, iPOS, and any other administrative details.

While Critical Theory has its basis in Continental Philosophy, the Philosophy PhD and Masters offered at ASU through SHPRS do not overlap with Continental Philosophy or critical theory; by contrast, SHPRS courses concentrate on ethics, analytics, applied philosophy and the American philosophical tradition. Three philosophy classes (PHI) are, nonetheless, listed as electives for the certificate.

The certificate will require a small degree of administration (listed in 2A), but no direct additional resources needed. Labor will come from existing faculty and staff. Units outside of English will contribute through teaching elective courses. These elective courses are offered regularly by these units.

The certificate will make use of resources that are underutilized in library holdings in books, journals, and online journals. No additional resources are needed.

3. ADMISSIONS PROCEDURES AND CRITERIA

The graduate certificate in critical theory is available to all ASU graduate students irrespective of their major and to non-degree graduate students and working professionals provided they meet eligibility criteria. Sample target majors include English, Women and Gender Studies, Art History, and Arts, Media, and Engineering. Students are advised that only nine hours may be taken in non-degree/certificate status and applied to a graduate degree/certificate program. Admission requirements for obtaining the graduate certificate include having:

- Completion of an undergraduate bachelor's degree from an U.S. accredited institution or equivalent.
- 2. Minimum of a 3.00 cumulative GPA (scale is 4.0=A) in the last 60 hours of a student's bachelor's degree program. If entering with a Master's degree, then a minimum of 3.00 cumulative GPA (scale is 4.0 = A) in the applicable Master's degree.
- 3. Any course in critical theory or related field taken at the upper level undergraduate level (such as ENG 401 Topics in Critical Theory) or at the graduate level (such as ENG 502 Contemporary Critical Theories). Note that ENG 502 is a core course for the certificate. It may be taken prior to the certificate (and credit given for having taken the class) or it may be taken once the student is admitted into the certificate program. It is not required as a prerequisite for entry into the certificate program.

English Proficiency Requirement for International Applicants:

We anticipate 5-10 new students in the first year and 5-10 new students each year for the subsequent two years holding steady at approximately 5 new students per year after the first three years. We anticipate students from across disciplines in the humanities, arts, and social sciences but particularly in English, Art History, and Arts Media Engineering.

Performance Criteria 2: 80% of students completing the certificate will receive an average score of 2 or better on their Statement of Critical Method Culminating Experience when evaluated on a scale of 1-3 (1 = unsatisfactory, 2 = satisfactory, 3 = meritorious) in the following areas: A) identifies which concepts, ideas, and methods are most fundamental to their own scholarship, B) explains the genealogy of these concepts, C) explains how these concepts, ideas, and methods structure the students own research

Outcome 3: Students will be able to build on, qualify or challenge claims in critical theory

Measure 1: Final class paper (for ENG502)

Performance Criteria 1: 80% of students in ENG502 will receive an average score of 2 or better on their final papers when evaluated on a scale of 1 to 3 (1 = unsatisfactory, 2 = satisfactory, 3 = meritorious) in the following areas: A) demonstrates awareness of key conversations and debates in existing scholarship; B) makes an argument that contributes new insights to existing conversations, debates, and knowledge in that scholarship; C) presents an organized, clear, coherent, and persuasive argument

Measure 2: Culminating Experience: Submission of a portfolio consisting of 1) the final ENG 502 writing assignment, 2) two other papers with each paper from a different theory course taken for the certificate and 3) a Statement of Critical Method that in 500-800 words explains how your theoretical approach connects these papers and shows the progress in your thinking.

Measure 3: student/alumni survey conducted upon completion of the certificate

Culminating Experience portfolio (Performance Criteria 2, Measure 2) will be evaluated by the certificate advisors when the student completes the certificate program.

In accord with the <u>Graduate Education satisfactory progress policy</u>, the student must maintain a minimum of a 3.00 cumulative GPA (scale is 4.0=A) each semester in graduate work while at ASU. If the student falls below a 3.00 cumulative GPA for a semester, it may be grounds for dismissal from the certificate. The student's case will be reviewed by the certificate advisors in conjunction with CLAS academic guidelines. If the student is deemed unsatisfactory, they will be recommended for dismissal to Graduate Education. There is a 6- year time limit to completion of the certificate. Satisfactory progress will be overseen by the certificate advisors Ron Broglio and Gregory Castle and the administrative coordinator, Sheila Luna.

G. Will this proposed certificate program allow sharing of credit hours from another ASU degree program to be used as part of this certificate program? Yes, the student can share credit hours between the Critical Theory certificate and the ASU degree program in which the student is enrolled. Students can use a maximum of 6 graduate credit hours from outside of ASU as pre-admission credits. Each course outside of ASU must be at least the 400 level and will be reviewed and approved by the certificate advisors prior to inclusion on the student's plan of study.
