Re: Disestablishment Proposal – Bachelor of Fine Arts in Art (Metals)

I have reviewed the attached proposal requesting the disestablishment of the BFA in Art (Metals) concentration within the School of Art which was included on the 2014-15 academic plan.

The School of Art can no longer support the breadth of courses necessary for this concentration. All current students will receive the coursework and instruction necessary to earn their degree, but not new students are being accepted. The school plans to provide a smaller offering of metals coursework to students in the school, and those students interested in a metals focus will have the opportunity through the BFA in Art (Sculpture) concentration.

My signature on the attached form indicates my support and approval for the disestablishment of this concentration.

Briefly describe the rationale for disestablishment:

The School of Art is no longer able to financially support the number and breadth of courses necessary for a concentration in this area.

Impact on other existing programs:

May include availability of course content for students in other majors who may need it; other.

Courses in this concentration are not required for other concentrations, however a less comprehensive offering of courses will be available for those in related areas who may be interested in the course content.

Impact on current students:

Estimate number of students still enrolled; anticipated date of last graduates; arrangements for continuing students and students in articulated transfer pathways (e.g., MAPP, TAG).

Required courses for continuing students enrolled in the metals concentration will be offered so they can complete their degrees in a timely manner. No new students are being accepted into the metals concentration. Future students interested in studying metals will be able to take courses and will be able to obtain a Bachelor of Fine Arts in Art (Sculpture) concentration with an emphasis in small metals. Courses in this concentration are not part of an articulated pathway. There are currently 7 students enrolled in the major and an additional 2 who are not enrolled this term but could return. The anticipated graduation date for all students is December 2016.
