1. Overview

- A. Provide a brief description (*not to exceed 250 words*) of the new concentration (including the specific focus of the new concentration, relationship to other concentrations in this degree program, etc).

The American Association of Colleges of Nursing (AACN) and National Organization of Nurse Practitioner Faculties (NONPF) are requiring a change by 2013 for nurse practitioner education-that will stipulate that nurse practitioners who care for the adult population be educated in an adult-gerontology specialty focus rather than in the current separate Adult Nurse Practitioner and Geriatric Nurse Practitioner specialties. Therefore, the Adult Nurse Practitioner Gerontology Nurse Practitioner concentrations offered under the DNP in Advanced Nursing Practice degree program at Arizona State University will be disestablished and a new concentration Adult-Gerontology Nurse Practitioner will be created to meet the new national requirements. The American Nurses Certification Corporation (ANCC) and the American Academy of Nurse Practitioners (AANP) will change their certification requirement to Adult-Gerontology Nurse Practitioner and will retire the Adult Nurse Practitioner and the Gerontology Nurse Practitioner credentials in 2015.

2. Impact Assessment

- A. Explain the unit's need for the new concentration (e.g., market demand, research base, direction of the discipline, and interdisciplinary considerations). How will the new concentration complement the existing degree program, including enrollment, national ranking, etc?

The Adult-Gerontology Nurse Practitioner concentration will replace the individual Adult Nurse Practitioner and Geriatric Nurse Practitioner concentrations as currently offered under the DNP in Advanced Nursing Practice degree program to meet a change in national standards and requirements for certification. COHNI has also submitted proposal requests to disestablish the existing Adult Nurse Practitioner and Geriatric Nurse Practitioner concentrations. The target audience of students is those students who are interested in primary care of the adult and geriatric populations. Students have been required to select one of these populations of interest in the current DNP Advanced Nursing Practice degree program; this change will prepare nurse practitioners to care for adults through the lifespan as required by AACN and NONPF.

Students graduating only from an adult nurse practitioner program or only from a gerontology nurse practitioner program will not be allowed to sit for national certification beginning in 2015. The course syllabi have been renamed and revised to meet the objectives and content required by AACN and NONPF for the adult-gerontology nurse practitioner. The courses have been approved by the CONHI Graduate Curriculum Committee.

Courses are offered as hybrid/on-line. Students are required to come to campus 1-3 times per semester with most curriculum delivered on-line.

The culminating document needed for completion of the Doctor of Nursing Practice in Advanced Nursing Practice is an Evidence-Base Mentored Applied Project. Each student will have a primary mentor and at least one committee member working with them on the project. Clinical practice residency hours will be used to carry out the project in a practice setting (work settings may be included, but specific objectives will be developed that will be different from the student's job). Each project will be developed individually with each student.

Each DNP in Advanced Nursing Practice student is required to complete and document a minimum of 1040 hours of clinical practice to sit for National Certification. The current program of study includes 1170 hours of clinical practice. Faculty arrange placements and clinical experiences.

Since we are proposing to disestablish the Adult Nurse Practitioner and the Geriatric Nurse Practitioner concentrations and creating a new concentration in Adult-Gerontology Nurse Practitioner, the faculty and advisors will already be in place for this new concentration.

- B.** How many students will be admitted immediately following final approval of the concentration? What are enrollment projections for the next three years?

Anticipate 21 students be admitted to this specialty in the fall of each year, beginning in August 2012. Currently 26 students are enrolled between the two concentrations that will be disestablished. We will transfer current students to new concentration once established- so that they meet national certification requirements. Students are currently receiving content as recommended in revised courses.
