Proposal to establish a Minor in Arabic Studies

At our current rapid rate of growth in Arabic Studies (more than 600 students in the academic year 2009-2010), SILC firmly believes that this is the best time to make a significant step forward. The creation of a Minor in Arabic Studies at ASU would not only provide a premiere resource for its many thousands of students, but also serve as a vital public resource for the community in the city, state, and country at large, as basis for cross-cultural dialogue, intellectual pursuit, as well as academic research. The demand for a Minor in Arabic Studies has been equally demonstrated by the remarkable success of the establishment of our Certificate in Arabic Studies in 2006. Many of these students have been constantly expressing interest in and inquiring about the possibility of adding a Minor even a Major to their programs. Arabic is one of the fastest growing languages and a number of government officials and agencies have been citing a demand for Arabic speakers and linguists. On a broader front, a Pentagon advisory panel known as the Defense Science Board reported recently that, "the United States today is without a working channel of communications to the world of Muslims and Islam" based on a shortage of employees knowledgeable in Arabic language and culture. Many of our students have been awarded prestigious awards including Fulbright and NSEP to further their Arabic Studies. Several are currently pursuing graduate studies in Arabic at Georgetown, Duke, and George Washington, as well as other universities with established Arabic programs. ASU has the potential to be well grounded in such an important area of study as well.

The director of the Arabic Program and the student advisor will follow clear measures for verification of completion of the Minor requirements

DEFINITION

These are the minimum requirements for approval. Individual undergraduate minors may have additional requirements.

A minor is an approved, coherent focus of academic study in a single discipline, other than the student's major, involving substantially fewer hours of credit than a corresponding major. Certain major and minor combinations may be deemed inappropriate either by the college or department of the major or minor. Inappropriate combinations include (but would not be limited to) ones in which an excessive number of courses in the minor are simultaneously being used to fulfill requirements of the student's major. A minor:

- Requires a minimum of 15 semester hours of which at least 9 semester hours must be upper division
- Is not intended for students pursuing a major in the department which offers the minor

1. Program Description (150 word maximum)

The Minor in Arabic Studies at Arizona State University provides students with instruction in Modern Standard Arabic (MSA), as well as Arabic culture and literature. Students who successfully complete the prescribed course work of the Arabic Minor (26 hours) are expected to be able to communicate effectively in Arabic and interact with native speakers of Arabic in MSA. Students will further be able to communicate in Arabic in the other two areas of language acquisition: reading and writing through reading authentic material in Arabic and write paragraph lengths documents in MSA. Literature courses expand students' knowledge in Arabic, Middle East, and Islamic culture and civilization. Students of all academic disciplines doing research on, or seeking employment in areas related to the Middle East or parts of the Arab world will find the Minor in Arabic highly beneficial. Students should work with their undergraduate advisor as well as Arabic advisors in declaring the Minor in Arabic Studies by their junior year.
