To whom it may concern:

I am writing to support the creation of a Ph.D. program in Transborder Studies. The program will be placed in the Department of Transborder Chicana/o and Latina/o Studies. This program emerges from a highly interdisciplinary unit that is growing in virtually all measures of success (e.g., majors, young talented scholars, grant funding, funding from donors). The program has two concentrations, Transborder Migration, Health and Applied Social Policy and Transborder Media and Expressive Culture. The Department has in place core faculty as well as associated faculty across the university to deliver this curriculum that uniquely straddles the social sciences and humanities.

Writing from the perspective of the chair of the Department of Political Science, we support the program enthusiastically. The discipline of Political Science is inherently interdisciplinary and has been for a long time. The ASU Department has five broad areas of study and each incorporates an expansive approach to the study of politics. In addition, students in the Ph.D. program in the Department of Political Science at ASU are quite interdisciplinary in the formation of their research topics and dissertations and the faculty are very eclectic toward the study of politics (e.g., political philosophers, experimentalists, econometricians, field research, case study, qualitative approaches broadly defined). The program in Transborder Studies will most certainly draw students from our Department into their seminars. And, we welcome the opportunity to teach any of their students in our seminars as appropriate for their programs of study. In addition, we anticipate that faculty from both units will serve on testing and dissertation committees. The Transborder program is a natural fit for us, especially the social science concentration, and will only improve our ability to deliver the Ph.D. in Political Science.

The program in Transborder Studies will be in demand not only in Arizona but from students across the Southwest and in countries stretching from Mexico well into South America. The program has an intriguing business plan that places little burden on the University. The program is beginning with a modest number of students reflecting the difficult academic job market. The program director has experience in launching, implementing and executing this kind of program.

This program deserves an opportunity to flourish. I support the program wholeheartedly. If you have further questions, please do not hesitate to contact me.
