PROPOSAL TO ESTABLISH A NEW UNDERGRADUATE CERTIFICATE

1. Overview

A. Provide a brief description of the new certificate.

The Peace Corps Prep certificate is designed to foster intellectual curiosity in international development while enhancing the competitiveness of Peace Corps applicants. The certificate program has six program tracks to include Education, Youth Development, Health, Environment, Community and Economic Development and Agriculture with a unifying mandatory course, BIS 355 Peace Corps Seminar. Centered around three core competencies in sector-specific skills, intercultural competence and leadership, the certificate program encourages participation in service learning, internship opportunities and study abroad experiences.

 - Clearly leads to advanced specialization in a field; or,
 - \boxtimes Is granted to a program that does not currently have a major.

This certificate is currently available to Arizona State University students through the United States Peace Corps but is non-credit bearing. The certificate program proposed by the College of Integrative Sciences and Arts will enable students to receive academic credit for their work while earning unique credit in addition to their current undergraduate degree or as a non-degree-seeking student.

D. Affiliation

The certificate program in Peace Corps Prep will be managed through the faculty of Leadership and Interdisciplinary Studies and has been approved by the faculty as an Interdisciplinary Studies concentration area. However, the program is open to all students and not affiliated with a specific degree program.

The United States Peace Corps currently offers a certificate that helps to qualify students for Peace Corps service. While the program does not guarantee acceptance, it does significantly boost students' chances of being accepted in the Peace Corps. The Peace Corps Prep certificate proposed by the College of Integrative Sciences and Arts will parallel the certificate offered by the United States Peace Corps but will allow students to receive academic credit for their work and will be open to students in any degree program and to non-degree-seeking students. In addition, Arizona State University is currently an approved Peace Corps Prep partner. - 442 impression that the rest of the world's cities still lag way behind the U.S. and Europe. The social sciences' debate over "global cities" anchors our examination of the reorganization

of metropolitan social space under impact of neoliberal globalization since the 1970s. Explores urban inequalities of slums and dreamworlds; compares vernacular and transnational styles of urbanism (in architecture, design, markets, consumerism, jobs, ads, ways of living); and asks how transnational flows of people, capital and culture have reconfigured ethnic relations and national identities rooted in global cities. Students become virtual transnational flâneurs, tacking between the slums and skyscrapers of global cities, and conduct guided research on a global megacity to investigate how the production of the global city changes the lived space and urban culture of local residents, and how they respond. We ask, whose city is it?

Inequality and Sustainability

Please see my suggestions regarding the Peace Corps Prep Certificate. Attached is also a marked-up file of the courses that you suggested for the Agricultural section with a few edits that are reflective of some recent changes to our courses and descriptions (which are now in the catalog).

BUA – we were told to phase our BUA courses back when we merged with W. P. Carey. I can double check with Kay to see if we could offer, but I think we are generally out of the BUA business.

- Instead of BUA, perhaps we could include some of the BUS courses we teach at Poly. My suggestion would be to include BUS 435 – Risk Management and Insurance. This course would make a lot of sense for a Peace Corps prep, albeit the pre-req is FIN 300.
- I would like to include the following: AGB 100 (Introduction to Agribusiness) and AGB 250 (Economics of Resource Allocation: Food and Agriculture). These are pre-reqs for many of the AGB classes listed. As well, they really make sense for something like this in terms of Peace Corps prep. I think the proposal said at least 3 units would need to be upper division, so this would not preclude these two.
- I would also like to include AGB 452 (Global Food and Agricultural Policy)
- Note many of our AGB courses are indeed taught as iCourses, so this should be useful. AGB 420, AGB 425, AGB 435, AGB 456, and AGB 250 are all taught as iCoruses as well as oCourses if this certificate will be offered through EdPlus as well.

Please let me know if you have any questions. I think this will be a great certificate for students interested in Peace Corps work.
