Conflict resolution will allow students to understand relevant theory (communication, conflict resolution and transformation, peace) and apply it to real-life situations of conflict, both at individual and collective spheres, to better address, through communication, the tensions and disputes that inevitably occur when people interact, professionals work together and governments work out their differences. The program is made unique by its attention to all these levels of communication, from the micro to the macro level.

Measure 1.1 Outcome will be measured by the successful completion of a paper drawn from PAX 230 that demonstrates an ability to analyze, synthesize and apply theory to practice of Conflict Resolution (direct measure).

Performance Criterion 1.1 At least 75% of the papers will demonstrate the students' ability to analyze, synthesize and apply theory. The papers will be assessed on the basis of the following rubric (instrument): (1) fails to meet expectations, (2) meets expectations, and (3) exceeds expectations.

Measure 1.2 Outcome will be measured by students' progress in college-level writing competency as related to analyses and syntheses will be assessed (direct measure) using a VALUE Rubric (instrument).

Performance Criterion 1.2 At least 75% of students will be progressing in college-level writing competency as indicated by their satisfactory results in the VALUE Rubric (instrument) assessment.

Learning Outcome 2 Students will be able to distinguish and respond to the arguments, biases, and motivations of the author while evaluating messages and texts.

Measure 2.1 Outcome will be measured by the successful completion of a paper drawn from COM 312, to be analyzed by a committee of three program faculty, that will demonstrate an ability to engage critically with texts, questioning their arguments, biases, and motivations (direct measure).

Performance Criterion 2.1 At least 75% of the papers will demonstrate the students' ability to engage critically with texts. The papers will be assessed on the basis of the following rubric (instrument): (1) fails to meet expectations, (2) meets expectations, and (3) exceeds expectations.

Measure 2.2 Outcome will be measured by the successful completion of a section of the final exam, in which students respond to academic texts (direct measure), through use of a VALUE Rubric (instrument).

Performance Criterion 2.2 At lease 7a5% of students will be progressing in their ability to respond to others' work as indicated by their satisfactory results in the VALUE Rubric (instrument) assessment.



Learning Outcome 3 Students will demonstrate the ability to utilize different media to systematize and present their understanding of conflict while engaging with multiliteracies.

Measure 3.1 Outcome will be measured by the successful completion of an electronic final portfolio, which will be analyzed by a committee of three program faculty for its engagement with multiple forms of literacy (direct measure).

Performance Criterion 3.1 At least 75% of the portfolios will demonstrate the students' ability to engage with multiliteracies and take a critical look at theory and practice related to their program of study. A rubric with several related elements will be created and the papers will be assessed on the basis of the following rubric (instrument): (1) fails to meet expectations, (2) meets expectations, and (3) exceeds expectations.

Learning Outcome 4 Students will demonstrate the ability to combine theory and practice to address problems in the real world.

Measure 4.1 Outcome will be measured by the successful completion of an electronic final portfolio, which will be analyzed by a committee of three program faculty for its author's ability to connect theory and practice (direct measure).

Performance Criterion 4.1 At least 75% of the portfolios will demonstrate the students' ability to connect theory to practice to address problems in the real world. A VALUE Rubric will be used (instrument).

This will be the only ASU degree especially focused on conflict resolution. This is a growing area of interest for a variety of reasons, which include greater access to communication tools and venues made possible by electronic communications, polarization of political views requiring mediation by specialists on conflict transformation, a greater understanding of the role of language in facilitating peace and understanding. While there will be a few courses and ideas that overlap with the concentration in Peace Studies offered as part of the Social and Cultural Analysis degree, the foci are different: conflict resolution also emphasizes skills to solve conflict at the individual- and small-group level (at work, for example), whereas Peace Studies focuses on a more humanitarian pursuit of peace.


