The Sports Law and Business concentration under the LLM will provide real world experience to aspiring professionals and future lawyers, teaching how to approach and solve industry problems through the lens of sports by considering all regulatory, revenue, reputational, and relationship factors involved in a given scenario. It will give theoretical and practical knowledge and experience necessary for success at the nexus

of sports and law.

A. Explain the unit's need for the new concentration (e.g., market demand, research base, direction of the discipline, and interdisciplinary considerations). How will the new concentration complement the existing degree program, including enrollment, national ranking, etc.?

Sport is a multi-billion dollar global industry. The competition for jobs is more highly competitive than ever, and the demand for high quality, "client-ready" professionals is higher than it has ever been. This concentration merges disciplines across the law, business, and athletics administration by teaching universal skills for problem-solving in high pressure, high dollar scenarios with C-level executives and other powerful people. This concentration provides a unique learning laboratory in one of the fastest growing markets in sports, the Phoenix Valley, and it will help solidify Arizona State as the hub for sports academia worldwide.

The most notable programs currently in existence demonstrate a body of knowledge that is already very well established. Law schools such as Columbia, Tulane, Marquette, Villanova, and many others have or are launching sports law programs with permanent faculty, dedicated centers, sports law journals, and major conferences. Arizona State is positioning itself as the thought leader in this field, harnessing the incredible interest in sports and creating partnerships, events, programs, and revenue generating opportunities that will each serve to raise the quality of the Sandra Day O'Connor College of Law. As the only existing program in the country that combines law and business in the context of sports, we are uniquely positioned to corner this market, currently ranked higher than any other law school considering such an opportunity other than Columbia, which is considering an online certificate.

Our current Master in Sports Law and Business has attracted the attention of JD and LLM candidates from all corners of the US and Canada, and this concentration serves to provide them a home for their learning. We aim to bring in top quality LLM students who may not otherwise attend Arizona State's College of Law, but for the opportunity to learn from our world class faculty associates and professors of practice in the sports industry. By formalizing a concentration in Sports Law and Business under the LLM degree, we are able to address the unique needs of these students with greater resources, faculty, and advising. The Sports Law and Business concentration for LLM students will not impact the other two proposed concentrations or the LLM (Global Legal Studies) program. The concentrations are offered to three distinct student populations. We already have the resources in place and available, should the interest in this program far exceed our growth forecasts. We chose to be modest in our predictions, because we thought it better to be conservative.

This concentration will complement the existing Master of Sports Law and Business, sharing its resources and adding greater legal perspective by adding LLM students to the already multi-disciplinary program in place through a partnership with W. P. Carey, Sun Devil Athletics, and the Sandra Day O'Connor College of Law.

This is interdisciplinary, existing as a three-way partnership between the College of Law, W. P. Carey School of Business, and Sun Devil Athletics. Housed in the College of Law, we have been granted the use of faculty, resources, and staff from each of our partners who have direct experience in the many fields of study that fall within the curriculum of the Sports Law and Business program.

The Sports Law and Business concentration will be established under the Master of Laws (LLM) degree, which requires the completion of 24 credits.

Applicants must fulfill the requirements of both the Graduate College and the Sandra Day O'Connor College of Law.

Applicants are eligible to apply to the program if they have earned a Juris Doctor degree in the U.S. or a law degree at a foreign institution that would qualify the applicant to practice law or pursue license to practice in that country.

Applicants must have a minimum of a 3.00 cumulative GPA (scale is 4.00 = "A") in the last 60 hours of a student's first bachelor's degree program, or applicants must have a minimum of a 3.00 cumulative GPA (scale is 4.00 = "A") in an applicable master's degree program.
