### Definition and minimum requirements:

An undergraduate certificate is a programmatic or linked series of courses from a single field or one that crosses disciplinary boundaries and may be freestanding or affiliated with a degree program. The certificate provides a structured and focused set of courses that can be used to enhance a student's baccalaureate experience or professional development.

An undergraduate certificate program:

- Requires a minimum of 15 credit hours of which at least 12 credit hours must be upper division
- Requires a minimum grade of "C" or better for all upper-division courses
- Consists of courses that must directly relate in whole or large part to the purpose of the certificate. Example: Geographic area certificates must include only courses specific to the title of the certificate, other than a non-English language
- Is cross disciplinary; or,

- Certified by a professional or accredited organization/governmental agency; or,
- Clearly leads to advanced specialization in a field; or,
- Is granted to a program that does not currently have a major

### 1. Overview

The Sports, Cultures and Ethics certificate provides a multi- and transdisciplinary inquiry into the social, ethical and cultural influence of athletics and sports spectatorship in our society. The certificate complements, and contributes to, the Global Sports Initiative that is currently underway at ASU. Our humanities approach will provide historical grounding, and an appreciation of how participation and investment in sports culture shapes our lives. We provide studies that include the ethical dimensions of supporting professional sports, the cultural implications of gendered sports cultures, and the religious aspects of fandom.

### B. Why should this be a certificate rather than a concentration or a minor?

As a program with a cross disciplinary curriculum, there isn't a major in SHPRS for which this would fit as a concentration. For the same reason, a certificate is a better structure than a minor.

It is not affiliated with a degree program. It will provide an opportunity for students to focus their inquiry on a range of social, ethical, and cultural questions about athletics and sports spectators. Sport is studied across ASU, but a humanitiesbased focus gives students an approach to and knowledge of the issues in sport that are not available in other ASU programs. The focus on humanities-based inquiry into sport will complement and enhance the knowledge of students studying sport in other sport-focused programs.

### D. Demand

This interdisciplinary certificate will serve students in the humanities and schools with sport-related degree programs. For students in sport-focused programs in the Walter Cronkite School of Journalism and Mass Communication, the W.P. Carey School of Business, and the School of Community Resources and Development, this humanities-based certificate will complement and enhance their degrees. Students want sports courses in the humanities. For example, 922 students took sports history courses in 2016. Many of these students are in the growing sport-related degree programs in Cronkite and W.P. Carey. For example, the number of sports and media studies majors grew from 60 to 1100 in just four years.

"The certificate will enhance the following sport-related undergraduate degree programs: W.P. Carey's sports and media studies, Cronkite's sports journalism, and the School of Community Resources and Development's community sports management. The certificate's liberal arts courses, many of which are humanities courses, will provide history, philosophy, social sciences, and interdisciplinary liberal arts training that encourage students to think about the broader impact and implications of sport in society, in a diversity of cultural contexts, and across time and space. The certificate will complement these students' degrees and resumes as they enter the competitive sports industry, and provide something tangible to show employers they have completed a program that prepared them to take seriously and articulate well-informed ideas about the social and cultural impacts of sport, and ethical considerations of sport and society.

In addition to students in sport-related undergraduate degree programs, students in liberal arts and other majors who have an interest in the study of sport and society will benefit from completing the certificate. For example, the certificate will enhance history and nutrition and supply chain degrees for students interested to pursue careers that intersect with the sports world."
