1. OVERVIEW

The emergency nurse practitioner certificate program provides preparation for an advanced practice registered nursing role eligible for certification by the American Academy of Nurse Practitioners Certification Board (AANPCB) in conjuction with the American Academy of Emergency Nurse Practitioners (AAENP). The Emergency Nurse Practitioner role is unique in that it spans population and acuity continuums. Emergency care focuses on potentially life-threatening conditions irrespective of the patient's initial chief complaint or reason for seeking care. Emergency Nurse Practitioners must be prepared to provide primary care, acute resuscitation, as well as manage complex, unstable conditions in patients of all ages. The AAENP recognizes only 12 emergency nurse practitioner programs in the United States. There are only two programs in the west and no Emergency Nurse Practitioner programs offered within Arizona. Currently, family nurse practitioners and registered nurses who wish to complete an emergency nurse practitioner program must travel out of state to do so. Due to the steady estimated 2% annual increase in Emergency Department (ED) volumes since 1996, there is increasing use of advanced practice providers (APPs) in EDs nationwide. The percent of EDs reporting staffing with APPs increased from 23% in 2010 to 62% in 2016. This certificate will support the required didactic and clinical preparation for certified emergency nurse practitioners to be prepared to sit for the national Emergency Nurse Practitioner certification and work in the pre-hospital, urgent, and emergency department setting.

National certification is required by the Arizona State Board of Nursing to practice as a nurse practitioner in Arizona. The emergency nurse practitioner certificate is only offered to students who are concurrent DNP students in the Family Nurse Practitioner concentration program or already hold a Family Nurse Practitioner certification.

This program is offered in-person and iCourse format that requires students to travel to campus for up to a week for orientation at the beginning of the program and then one or two times per semester.

Every certificate student must complete 270 hours of direct patient care as part of their total required clinical hours with a Nurse Practitioner or Physician preceptor in the clinical setting. Documented clinical experiences are required by the certification organization (AANP) in order for the graduate to be eligible to take the national Emergency Nurse



Practitioner certification examination. Focused clinical experiences are arranged with appropriate preceptors and administrators. Every attempt will be made to arrange this in the student's geographical area. In the event that clinical sites are unavailable in that area or if the faculty determine the student needs additional faculty supervision of skills, the student will be required to complete the clinical experience in the Phoenix area. Experiences with disadvantaged and multicultural populations are encouraged as are experiences in rural areas, and sites are available for these experiences.

Admission for this degree program will be monitored by the CONHI Student Services team. Applicants will follow a stringent admission policy that is comparable to all other ASU CONHI DNP degree programs as well as meeting the Graduate College admission requirements. Advising for this program is the responsibility of our DNP Program Office and the Family Nurse Practitioner faculty. The DNP Program Office has two full time administrators and one full time clinical placement coordinator.

5. COURSES

A. New Courses Required for Proposed Certificate: Provide course prefix, number, title, credit hours and brief description for any new courses required for this certificate program.

DNP 610 Principles of Advanced Emergency Nursing I - The purpose of this course is to introduce essential concepts in the provision of advanced practice nursing in emergency medicine. This course emphasizes the acquisition of the knowledge and skills necessary to deliver safe and effective care to pediatric, adult, and geriatric patients presenting in pre-hospital, urgent care, and emergency department settings. A systems approach is used to address common medical emergencies such as cardiac, respiratory, abdominal, and neurological.

DNP 611 ENP Practicum I: Advanced Emergency Nursing Practice - This course is designed to provide the emergency nurse practitioner with a broad knowledge base to evaluate and manage patients in pre-hospital, urgent care, and emergency department settings. A systems approach is used to address common medical emergencies. This supervised clinical practicum provides students with the opportunity to develop a systematic approach and critical thinking skills in the identification, implementation, and evaluation of therapeutic strategies based on relevant theory and research related to emergency care.

DNP 630 – Principles of Advanced Emergency Nursing II - The purpose of this course is to build upon essential concepts in the provision of advanced practice nursing in emergency medicine. The focus of this course is to prepare the student to implement the role of the Advanced Practice Emergency Nurse. This course emphasizes the application of the knowledge and skills necessary to deliver safe and effective care to pediatric, adult and geriatric patients presenting in pre-hospital, urgent care, and emergency department settings. A systems approach is used to address common medical emergencies such as trauma, wounds, ophthalmologic, dental, otolaryngology, endocrine, shock, gynecological, obstetric, toxicology, infectious disease, and psychiatric emergencies.

DNP 631 - ENP Practicum II: Advanced Emergency Nursing Practice - This course is designed to provide the emergency nurse practitioner with a broad knowledge base to evaluate and manage patients in pre-hospital, urgent care, and emergency department settings. A systems approach is used to address common medical emergencies. Relevant theory and research related to emergency care management, pharmacologic and non-pharmacologic interventions are examined. Evidence-based, cost-effective practice is analyzed, examining principally the effects of low literacy on provider-patient communication, particularly patient education. This supervised clinical practicum provides students with the opportunity to further develop, refine and utilize a systematic approach and critical thinking skills in the identification, implementation, and evaluation of therapeutic strategies based on relevant theory and research related to emergency care.



DNP 649 – Advanced Physiology - This course will focus on integrating the structure and function, including the molecular and cellular levels that are vital to the overall functioning of the human being across the lifespan. It is highly encouraged that students taking this course have a basic understanding of physiological principles to then be able to learn the advanced concepts covered in this course. This course serves as an important fundamental foundation required for advanced practice providers and will help support students in their progression into advanced pathophysiology and clinical specialty course work. The focus of the course is to examine the complex interactions of multiple body systems in helping to maintain homeostasis and proper body functioning to promote a foundation for health. The course will use clinical scenarios to promote an innovative way to integrate the complex physiological concepts. Students will be encouraged to synthesize the physiological concepts to advance their knowledge as a graduate/doctoral level student.

This Nurse Practitioner certificate program, accredited by the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education, provides a foundation for this specialty. Courses focus on the development of a framework for patients with unexpected illness in pre-hospital, urgent care, and emergency department settings. The focus of these courses is on the delivery of health care services to patients across the lifespan in pre-hospital, urgent care, and emergency department settings.

This program is offered in in-person and iCourse format that requires students to travel to campus for up to a week for orientation at the beginning of the program and then two or three times per semester.

Every certificate student must complete 270 hours of direct patient care with a Nurse Practitioner or Physician preceptor in the clinical setting. Documented clinical experiences are required by the certification organization (AANP) in order for the graduate to be eligible to take the national Emergency Nurse Practitioner certification examination.

Focused clinical experiences are arranged with appropriate preceptors and administrators. Every attempt will be made to arrange this in the student's geographical area. In the event that clinical sites are unavailable in that area or if the faculty determine the student needs additional faculty supervision of skills, the student will be required to complete the clinical experience in the Phoenix area. Experiences with disadvantaged and multicultural populations are encouraged as are experiences in rural areas, and sites are available for these experiences.
