## OVERVIEW

- A. Provide a brief description of the new concentration (including the specific focus of the new concentration, relationship to other concentrations in this degree program, etc.).

The BA in organizational leadership (project management) concentration will offer a theory and practice driven curriculum to prepare students to be excellent project managers and project management leaders. The BA in organizational leadership (OGL) has long offered two very popular project management courses (OGL 320: Foundations of Project Management and OGL 321: Project Leadership, Strategy and Scope) to OGL majors and students throughout the university. Our course catalog contains another six project management courses that would provide a valuable curriculum for a project management concentration. Students will learn foundations of project management, project risk management, project quality management, project time management, project cost management, resource management and project procurement management.

The core curriculum of the existing BA in organizational leadership will be enhanced by these six project management courses to create a 54-credit degree integrating leadership and project management. The BA in organizational leadership currently has no concentrations.

The Faculty of Leadership & Interdisciplinary Studies in the College of Integrative Sciences and Arts currently offers the BA in organizational leadership to 1,340 undergraduates. We have a strong faculty who are well positioned to establish project management concentration that builds upon our existing leadership curriculum with valuable project management leadership, theory and skills.

- B. Explain the unit's need for the new concentration (e.g., market demand, research base, direction of the discipline, and interdisciplinary considerations). How will the new concentration complement the existing degree program?

According to EMSI Analyst Arizona data between August 2015 and December 2016, Project Manager was listed as the "Top Posted Job Title" with 36,764 jobs (much more than the second-most posted title with only 9,532 jobs), Project Management was listed as the "Top Hard Skill" with 35,040 jobs posted (ahead of Management with 33,413 postings), and Leadership was listed as the "Most Relevant Soft Skill" with 11,628 jobs (ahead of Scheduling--Project Management at 6,898). Project Management Institute (PMI) certification was listed as the "Top Certification" with 890 jobs. (<https://www.pmi.org>)

Furthermore, according to the Project Management Institute's Global Accreditation Center for Project Management Education Programs (<https://www.pmi.org/global-accreditation-center/about-gac>), there are currently only seventeen accredited bachelor's degree project management programs in the world. None of the accredited project management programs are in Arizona, and only two of the seventeen programs offer both on-campus and digital immersion options.

Additional, according to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS), project manager salaries range anywhere from \$74,000 to \$100,000 per year. The BLS also indicates that the average project manager receives a little more than \$42 per hour in wages. (<https://www.investopedia.com/articles/wealth-management/021616/project-manager-job-description-average-salary.asp>)

Students are prepared for a range of positions in the public and private sectors, including in government, information technology, nonprofit agencies, in businesses and the service industry. Students are prepared for jobs as Management Analysts, Loss Prevention Managers, Information Technology Project Managers, Technical Project Manager (IT), Wind Energy Project Managers, Regulatory Affairs Managers, Compliance Managers, Investment Fund Managers, Supply Chain Managers, Security Managers, Project Manager, Senior Project Manager, Portfolio/Project Manager, Program Manager, Director of Project Management, and Project Manager: Agile, etc. In addition, students may seek advanced study in the form of graduate and post-baccalaureate degrees.

Therefore, a degree in organizational leadership with a concentration in Project Management will fulfill the market need for two of the most relevant and top skills in the current job market.

ASU does not currently offer any degree, concentration, minor or certificate in Project Management. Only organizational leadership (OGL) possesses a sufficient bank of project management courses to offer a concentration in broadly transferable project management skills. OGL currently enrolls many non-OGL majors in our Project Management classes—more than 100 every semester. The courses are so broadly applicable that two of the courses (OGL 240 and OGL 320) have been built into three other majors' requirements: Health Care Compliance & Regulations (NUHCCRBS) requires OGL 320, Integrative Health (NUIHLTBS) requires OGL 240 (as one of four elective courses), Environmental Science (ASENVBA) at Havasu requires OGL 240.

ASU does offer 23 other individual courses related to project management, but most are dedicated to major-specific applications (e.g. CIS 560: IT Services and Project Management or ENG 382: Digital Project Management for Humanities) and most departments explicitly or effectively restrict enrollment in these courses to their own student majors. Most are graduate courses, and most are offered only on campus (i.e. only four of the 23 non-OGL courses are offered through ASU Online: CIS 311, CON 532, HRC 568, and IEE 458).
