1. Overview

The minor in social justice and human rights spans the social sciences and the humanities to prepare students to meet the challenges of twenty-first century issues of social justice and protection of human rights in local, national, international and global contexts. The minor introduces students to principles and practices of everyday humanitarianism, multimedia advocacy, and theories and practices of social justice and human rights.

B. Why should this be a minor rather than a concentration?

The major is already well established, and we would like to offer the minor counterpart as we do with most of our degrees. We believe this minor works well in conjunction with other majors, including political science, sociology, psychology, interdisciplinary arts and sciences, social and cultural analysis, and many others.

We are proposing the minor to offer other New College majors the opportunity to learn more about social justice and human rights. If approved, there will be a minor, a bachelor’s degree and a master’s degree in this timely subject area.




