The Spanish Linguistics PhD prepares students for entrance into the academic profession (teachers and scholars) as well as for professions outside of academia. This degree offers advanced interdisciplinary graduate training that combines key areas in second language acquisition and teaching, applied linguistics, heritage language research and pedagogy, sociolinguistics, and bilingualism. By providing advanced training in intersciplinary fields within the broad area of Spanish Linguistics, students wil receive well-rounded academic preparation.

2. PROGRAM NEED

Explain why the university should offer this program (include data and discussion of the target audience and market). This new degree addresses the increasing national and state-wide demand for more graduates with a Ph.D. in Spanish linguistics, with tracks in second language acquisition and teaching and Spanish heritage studies and sociolinguistics. The current Modern Language Association Spanish job list contains a substantial number of ads for Spanish linguists (44% of all positions in Spanish, 2016-2017, https://www.mla.org/content/download/77249/2164846), especially for positions in Applied Linguistics and language program coordination. Graduates from the program can also obtain positions outside of academia such as language program coordinator, language program director, educational software developer, editing specialist, and research analyst. This degree will not only help us attain teaching and research excellence and prepare the next generation of experts in Spanish Linguistics but it will also play an essential role in community service and outreach. Graduates of this program will be prepared to conduct research and serve local populations in diverse issues such as language learners, and to harness the power of technology to better teach language to a growing population of students. In addition, the degree program will result in increased visibility for the School of International Letters and Cultures (SILC) and ASU, locally and nation-wide, by addressing the growing need for in-service training for K-12 and high-school Spanish language teachers and administrators involving the use of innovative language teaching practices.

The program focuses exclusively on Spanish linguistics and applied linguistics and it expands the current track in Spanish Linguistics within the PhD in Spanish into its own program. Spanish literature and culture and Spanish Linguistics are two different fields of study and do not share content commonalities. The current PhD in Spanish will focus exclusively on Spanish literature and culture tracks and the proposed PHD will focus on Spanish Linguistics.

It will not overlap with other programs in English or Education. This program does not lead to teacher certification.

We hired an assistant professor of Spanish Linguistics to begin in Fall 2019 and we are in the process of hiring an Assistant Clinical Professor in Spanish Applied linguistics to begin in Spring 2020.

This office is staffed by one full-time coordinator. The Spanish Linguistics faculty graduate advisor in SILC will advise students in the program. Recruitment and retention efforts will be the responsibility of the advisor and the affiliated faculty.

The Graduate Program Student Services Support Coordinator in SILC will oversee administration of admissions, iPOS, and any other administrative details.
