OVERVIEW

A. Provide a brief description of the new concentration (including the specific focus of the new concentration, relationship to other concentrations in this degree program, etc.).

Presently, the BS in counseling and applied psychological science (CAP) has no concentrations. The proposed substance abuse and addictions concentration will offer a theory and practice-driven curriculum to prepare students to screen, diagnose, assess and treat substance abuse and addictions using various counseling skills and techniques. While this concentration does not prepare students to be license-eligible counselors, it is designed to meet the coursework requirements for the Licensed Substance Abuse Technician credential through the Arizona Board of Behavioral Health Examiners (AzBBHE).

B. Explain the unit's need for the new concentration (e.g., market demand, research base, direction of the discipline, and interdisciplinary considerations). How will the new concentration complement the existing degree program?

According to EMSI Analyst data, in 2016, there were a total of 220 non-distance programs offered in substance abuse/addictions counseling in the country. In Arizona, there are only 2 universities offering a Bachelor's degree, and 3 colleges offering an Associate's degree/certification in substance abuse and addictions. The small number of programs falls short of the market need. EMSI data indicate that the need for for substance abuse, behavioral disorder, and mental health counselors is expected to increase by 13% from 2018 to 2023. Moreover, among the Mental and Social Health Services and Allied Professions, Substance Abuse Counselors and Addictions Counselors were the top posted job titles ahead of social work, clinical supervisors, and recovery specialists with 92% of jobs listing training in substance abuse as the "Top Hard Skill." The projected job outlook for Substance Abuse and Behavioral Disorder Counselors is estimated to increase by 22% from 2014-2024."

CAP 351 Issues in Assessment, Diagnosis and Treatment (3)

Builds upon previous course work. Provides students with an understanding of the major screening, assessment and diagnostic approaches for substance abuse and addictions. Students will obtain knowledge of (1) models, (2) instruments, and (3) diagnostic criteria, and will be able to link this knowledge to treatment planning and interventions for addictions. Please note: the goal of this course is not to diagnose or treat individuals with disorders. Rather, it is designed to give students a basic understanding of diagnostics and evidence-based treatments to inform work in the mental health field.

Current staff, administration and advising resources will be utilized. As the program grows, we will reevaluate the needs and explore the possibility of additional staff support.
