Topic Description

NEW 300 International Cities: Study of Black Amsterdam is a 3-credit course designed to expand students' awareness of Amsterdam and the impact that people of the African Diaspora have had on its politics, society, food, art, culture and history. Students will study beforehand subjects ranging from the Dutch involvement in the Transatlantic slave trade to the influence of the African Diaspora on Amsterdam's politics, arts and culture. During Spring Break they will explore the city and experience Amsterdam's

Black cultural centers, galleries, museums, archives, canals, and eateries returning with a full exposure to Black Amsterdam life and living.

HU: Humanities, Arts and Design

Rationale and Objectives

The humanities disciplines are concerned with questions of human existence and meaning, the nature of thinking and knowing, with moral and aesthetic experience. The humanities develop values of all kinds by making the human mind more supple, critical, and expansive. They are concerned with the study of the textual and artistic traditions of diverse cultures, including traditions in literature, philosophy, religion, ethics, history, and aesthetics. In sum, these disciplines explore the range of human thought and its application to the past and present human environment. They deepen awareness of the diversity of the human heritage and its traditions and histories, and they may also promote the application of this knowledge to contemporary societies.

The study of the arts and design, like the humanities, deepens the student's awareness of the diversity of human societies and cultures. The arts have as their primary purpose the creation and study of objects, installations, performances, and other means of expressing or conveying aesthetic concepts and ideas. Design study concerns itself with material objects, images and spaces, their historical development, and their significance in society and culture. Disciplines in the arts and design employ modes of thought and communication that are often nonverbal, which means that courses in these areas tend to focus on objects, images, and structures and/or on the practical techniques and historical development of artistic and design traditions. The past and present accomplishments of artists and designers help form the student's ability to perceive aesthetic qualities of artwork and design.

The Humanities, Arts and Design are an important part of the General Studies program, for they provide an opportunity for students to study intellectual and imaginative traditions and to observe and/or learn the production of artwork and design. The knowledge acquired in courses fulfilling the Humanities, Arts and Design requirement may encourage students to investigate their own personal philosophies or beliefs and to understand better their own social experience. In sum, the Humanities, Arts and Design core area enables students to broaden and deepen their consideration of the variety of human experience.

Throughout the course, students will explore the shaping of Black Amsterdam from the origins of African Diasporic inhabitants, to the art and literature that they continue to develop as a representation of their cultural influence and prominence. That influence is demonstrated in the architecture, the paintings, the galleries, the spoken word establishments, the music halls, etc. A Black aesthetic is very visible when you know where to look. Most importantly, students will travel to Amsterdam to experience firsthand the lives, cultural experiences and influences on art and literature. They will visit, for example, tea houses where poetry is created, and visit galleries where major artists' work is displayed conveying the influence on the creative arts. There is an exhibit, "In the Time of Rembrandt" that depicts his work using African descendants as models and a discussion of the impact of their presence in Amsterdam.

Revise and resubmit: The highlighted portion of the syllabus does lend itself to the HU, but we need more information as to the nature of the class assignments and a revised Course Objectives and Learning Outcomes that emphasize critical thinking and critical analysis. Unit Summaries deal with "concepts and criticisms and items for discussion" but that's too vague, and we cannot tell from this alone to what extent critical thinking is integrated in this assignment. The Multimedia Presentation/ Portfolio does require students to interact with "video, notes, photos", which lends itself to the HU, but, again, there is no clear critical analysis here. We recommend that the professors revise and resubmit with a focus on illustrating how the class assignments, learning objectives, and course outcomes lend itself to critical thinking and critical analysis.
